

The Virtue of Prudence

MORNING PRAYER

Monday

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

REFLECTION

In reflecting on War and Peace last week, we prayed that the leaders of the world show '*prudence*' in their decision making. Prudence is a virtue: It is something to admire in others and something to acquire for yourself.

But what does Prudence mean? Does it mean more than thinking to cover your head if its going to be very hot, or taking an umbrella if it might rain?

St John Henry Newman described Prudence as the virtue which '*discerns the end in every beginning, the origin in every end, and knowing how the path lies from one to the other*'.

In other words, Prudence is the ability to make decisions based on the reality of things, of things as they really are, in order to achieve what is good.

So what do you need to be prudent?

First, you need to learn from what has happened in the past. Then you need to be open-minded to the future; what are the likely consequences of any action you might take.

And lastly, you need to be prepared to accept good advice from those who know better than you.

REFLECTION

Notice the picture of the virtue of Prudence in the school library. You'll see that the artist Giotto imagines the virtue of Prudence as a student sitting at her desk, thoughtfully looking at herself in a mirror.

In this way, Giotto suggests Prudence means being *grounded in reality*, not in a fantasy world, or in wishful thinking.

The prudent person is someone who can see things clearly, who is living in the light of truth, 'warts and all' rather than the darkness of ignorance and wishful thinking.

The subjects which you study at school are all designed to help you understand and appreciate the truth, and then to learn lessons from those in history or in literature who have acted prudently or imprudently according to the truth.

That is why the virtue of Prudence is the foundation of all the other virtues which you need to acquire as you seek to be a

REFLECTION

What is the opposite of Prudence?

It is to be blind to reality:

To have a distorted idea of who we are,
and to have a distorted idea of the reality of our situation.

The person without the virtue of Prudence behaves like a fool,
and he can't see that he is a fool because he has no self-
awareness.

For Newman, the foolish put 'Self as their supreme teacher,
they are careless to know what God teaches them, and fearless
of condemnation'.

We might laugh at the fool, but there is something tragic about
someone who is completely lacking in prudence, because he is
unaware that he is lacking in the one virtue that will help him
live a noble life.
